



Huron Wind churns out strong performance in 2008 ***Improved output, capacity factor from Ontario's first commercial wind farm***

TIVERTON, ON. – FEB. 13, 2009 – Huron Wind, Ontario's first commercial wind farm, generated enough clean electricity in 2008 to meet the power needs of more than 2,000 homes, according to year-end results released today.

The five-turbine wind farm saw a two per cent increase in output to 24,831 megawatt hours (MWh) and an improved capacity factor of 31.5 per cent during its first year of operations under Bruce Power, which purchased Ontario Power Generation's share of Huron Wind on Feb. 15, 2008.

"We have long believed that wind and nuclear generation naturally complement one another, which is why we introduced wind power to Ontario on a commercial basis back in 2002," said Duncan Hawthorne, Bruce Power's President and Chief Executive Officer.

"More consumers are telling us they want their electricity from sources that do not contribute to global warming, which is why we are considering ways to replicate the wind and nuclear energy hub concept pioneered here in Bruce County in places like Nanticoke, Saskatchewan and Alberta."

With capacity factors of 31.5 per cent in 2008 and 31 per cent in 2007, Huron Wind remains among the best performing wind farms in Ontario. Opened in November of 2002, Huron Wind consists of five 1.8-megawatt turbines with a combined output of nine megawatts. From the ground to the top of their highest blades, the turbines are approximately 117 metres tall, which means they would reach through the ceiling of Toronto's Roger Centre.

Huron Wind is located seven kilometres northwest of Tiverton adjacent to the Bruce Power Visitors' Centre, where thousands people come each year to learn how clean electricity is made by harnessing the power of the wind and the atom.

"We consider Huron Wind to be the community's wind farm, which is why we are working to make it the best in its class," Hawthorne said. "We encourage anyone interested in learning more about our wind farm to come to our Visitors' Centre or visit us online at www.huronwind.com."
